We associate Lent with a time of preparation, a time of self-abnegation, a time of wilderness wanderings as we travel with Christ through the dangerous and lonely desert of life. Before Jesus is called into the desert, a proclamation is said over him, "You are my Son, whom I dearly love; in you I find happiness" (Mark 1:11). Throughout the biblical story, God acts, God proclaims. God takes on the obligation to covenant with God's people, calling us beloved and giving us a community to remind us of this love so that we can enter our difficult places of wilderness knowing that we are loved and are not alone.

Salford/Advent Garden Update:

Greetings fellow gardeners, my how time flies by. It is almost time to start thinking about tomatoes, onions, peppers potatoes and string beans again. But first I would like to invite you to our annual fund raising luncheon at Salford Mennonite church at 12 noon on Sunday February 25th, As in years past we are inviting the organizations we donate our veggies to attend, give us an idea of what they do during the year and how our veggies are used.

This year we are asking for \$9,000 dollars. That is a lot more then we have ever asked for in the past. For 17 years the Alderfer family has generously let the garden use their barn located next to the garden, free of charge. Last year the property was sold and the new owner needed the barn for their own use. In November we cleaned out the barn of all garden equipment and supplies. Some were stored in the Salford church garage, some stored in our new cool shed, some items had to be left outside as we ran out of room. I am hoping to raise \$9,000 to help offset the cost of a new Garden Shed built on Saford's property near the garden. One big enough that will meet the needs of the garden for many years to come.

Lent Resources for All Ages The theme of this year's Lenten journey in our collective worship at Salford will be "Christ with Us". This year's six-week Lenten journey invites us to step into what it means to be a covenant people and to do that with Jesus by our side. "Christ is among us, reminding us of who we are, and even when we fail, reminding us of grace and calling us beloved."

In case a devotional or prayer guide will help you to do this, here's a bit of info about those offered at Salford this year:

Copies of the Lent at Home: Christ with Us <u>devotional</u> and <u>calendar</u> (laminated to serve as a placemat) will be available in the foyer starting this Sunday. These

offer simple scriptures and activities for daily or weekly prayer and include some options like "desert quests" (mindful walks in nature), developing a family covenant, and creating a centerpiece for your table.

In the foyer you'll also find the **"Breaking the Chains"** devotional that we've used in years' past - 40 links with prayer, scripture, and activities emphasizing God as liberator and source of grace. Many thanks to Laura Stalter for making these chains!

Welcoming Path Learning Corner

Many people refrain from talking about sexual orientation and gender identity or expression because it feels taboo, or because they're afraid of saying the wrong thing. This weekly primer on terminology is to help give us the words and meanings to help make conversations easier and more comfortable. For a few weeks, we are focusing on terms related to <u>gender identity</u>.

Gender expression: External appearance of one's gender identity, usually expressed through behavior, clothing, body characteristics or voice, and which may or may not conform to socially defined behaviors and characteristics typically associated with being either masculine or feminine.

Gender fluid: A person who does not identify with a single fixed gender or has a fluid or unfixed gender identity.

Gender dysphoria: Clinically significant distress caused when a person's assigned birth gender is not the same as the one with which they identify.

Intersex: Intersex people are born with a variety of differences in their sex traits and reproductive anatomy. There is a wide variety of difference among intersex variations, including differences in genitalia, chromosomes, gonads, internal sex organs, hormone production, hormone response, and/or secondary sex traits.



One for the Blackbird, One for the Crow, A Novel By: Olivia Hawker




Wyoming, 1876. For as long as they have lived on the frontier, the Bemis and Webber families have relied on each other. With no other settlers for miles, it is a matter of survival. But when Ernest Bemis finds his wife, Cora, in a compromising situation with their neighbor, he doesn't think of survival. In one impulsive moment, a man is dead, Ernest is off to prison, and the women left behind are divided by rage and remorse.

Losing her husband to Cora's indiscretion is another hardship for stoic Nettie Mae. But as a brutal Wyoming winter bears down, Cora and Nettie Mae have no choice but to come

together as one family—to share the duties of working the land and raising their children. There's Nettie Mae's son, Clyde—no longer a boy, but not yet a man—who must navigate the road to adulthood without a father to guide him, and Cora's daughter, Beulah, who is as wild and untamable as her prairie home.

Bound by the uncommon threads in their lives and the challenges that lie ahead, Cora and Nettie Mae begin to forge an unexpected sisterhood. But when a love blossoms between Clyde and Beulah, bonds are once again tested, and these two resilient women must finally decide whether they can learn to trust each other—or else risk losing everything they hold dear.

Shortly after a young couple vow to love each other through sickness and health, their commitment is tested when a tragic farm accident destroys their world. Surviving the insurmountable damage seems impossible, but when a community comes together and profoundly demonstrates what can be done through prayer and support—and a Kansas farm family puts all their trust and faith in God—lives are inspired by results that are nothing short of miracle.

For some, farming is a calling more than an occupation, and to those who participate in the time-honored production of

America's food supply, the challenge of staying solvent through the generations is a continual concern. And when tragedy strikes at the heart of a farming family, the repercussions demand the best of individuals and community, calling forth that spirit and resolve so essential to those who live and grow on the land. This mother's account of her adult son's shocking experience with loss and the subsequent struggle to maintain life as a husband and father and regain his role within the rural landscape of the Kansas heartland, is a heartfelt tribute to the qualities that made and keep America's precious farm families doing what they do best.
