## **Holy Week is Here**

Holy week begins this Sunday with the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. This Sunday is known both as Palm Sunday and Passion Sunday. This year, Regina Wenger, a Mennonite minister now on staff at MHEP, will bring the message at Salford. As always, our children will lead off the service processing with palm fronds.

In order for us to be fully prepared for the joy of Easter, it is important to become immersed in each of the services of Holy Week. Some years we've had a "Maundy Thursday" service at Salford. This year we will remember the death of Jesus on Good Friday at 7 p.m., through a simple service of scripture, songs and choir selections-the "Tenebrae" service. "Tenebrae" means "darkness" or "shadows." It is a quiet and reflective service which was created by monks to be used in monasteries; it is the most solemn service of the Christian year. You may not be drawn to attend a somber church service; but remembering the death of Jesus is a needed part of our spiritual experience, if we are to come to Easter rejoicing.

Our choir and pastoral team, along with many faithful volunteers, have prepared well for this week. Join us on Friday evening and again on Sunday as we go the last steps with Jesus toward his empty tomb! - Dave Greiser, lead pastor

# Did You Know? Celebrating Salford Mennonite Child Care Center's Upcoming 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

On September 6, 1984 Salford Day Care officially opened its doors to children aged 6 months to 5 years old. The center was open year-round from 6:30 AM to 6:00 PM, closing only for major holidays and one week in June for Summer Bible School (now known as Peace Camp). The first director was Barbara Landis, and new E.M.U. graduate Donna Moyer and two M.C.C. trainees from Germany and Switzerland were the first teachers/teacher aides. By December, the enrollment was already 28 children.

Over the years the Day Care saw many exciting transformations. There were staffing changes as well as updates for facilities and programming. Responding to parents' needs "before and after" care hours were offered, a licensed full-day Kindergarten classroom was added, and summer camps for older siblings were launched. From the start there was a consistent priority of providing for staff salary needs as well as affordable care for families.

## The Holy In the Night – Finding Freedom in a Season of Waiting An Advent Devotional By: Shannon W. Dycus


