Salford Mennonite Church sits on the homelands of the Lenape people, who have stewarded the lands for thousands of years. In 1718 it was part of a 200-acre purchase by immigrant Mennonite settlers Henrich and Magdalena Ruth from surveyor-speculator David Powell. The surrounding Perkiomen watershed had been "bought" by William Penn from Lenape headman Maughoughsin in 1684 for two coats, "four pair stockings, and four bottles of sider."
